A Passion for Natural History

It all started with a book of John James Audubon's bird image s. As a child, J. Gilbert Johnston would spend evenings flipping the pages of that book, a gift from his parents, memorizing bird names while fighting sleep. His grandmother followed



that gift with one of her own-a biography of Audubon. Johnston's fascination with these images continued to grow as he began collecting bird prints in college and studying those birds on his wilderness travels. "Everywhere I would go, I would take guides to birds and guides to flowers and trees because I wanted to know what I saw," he says.

Now Johnston, a Birmingham native, is the owner of Antique Nature Prints. He'll share his knowledge with art and natural history enthusiasts during a Nov. 16 lecture series and sale benefitting Aldridge Botanical Gardens. Johnston's lecture, "A Passion for Natural History," is scheduled for 1 p.m. and will be followed by University of West Alabama Professor Dr. John Hall's lecture, "William Bartram in Alabama," at

2:30 p.m. Both will be held at the Hoover Library Theatre.

An exhibition and sale of Johnston's print collection will take place on Nov. 19 to 22 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Aldridge Gardens. The collection includes original nature prints by John James Audubon, Mark Catesby, John Gould, Prideaux John Selby and other natural history scientists/artists.

"Holding an original is holding a little piece of history," Johnston says. "These things are older than we are and we are kind of the custodians of them for a period of time, then we pass them on to someone else." A percentage of each purchase goes to Aldridge Gardens



Johnston's lecture will introduce people to

the origin of these prints, which are scientific art. Attendees will learn about the rediscovery of Greek writing during the Renaissance and the genesis of botanical art through medicine.
